An exciting full day of cricket in the SCCL with two games vying for the headlines in the final game of Win Draw Lose ...for now

A fantastic game at **Sentinel** that ultimately gave the hosts a much needed win against a St Georges side who gave it everything but still ended up on the losing side. Tom Griffiths, a player now established at this level opened up for Sentinel with 41, and a quality 75 from veteran Aussie Mal Serplet set the innings up for 16 year old Jacob Binnersley to launch an outstanding 91 ball unbeaten century in front of league chairman Gordon Smith whose own son Kevin is the all time youngest Premier Division centurion at 15. Young Binnersley a player who we will no doubt hear a lot of in the future was supported by captain Ed Ashlin who ended on 29no as the Engines finished on 271-3. An imposing total for the Dragons to chase, but thanks to a brilliant 142 from Faizan Khan they came pretty close before running out of steam at 244ao. Rico Fourie took 3-53, with Matty Cliffe and Tom Griffiths taking 2 each themselves, but despite the knock from Faizan, it was Binnersley about whom all the talk post game was, Ed Ashlin paying a fulsome tribute to his young star. A total of 141 for Whitchurch was still just about competitive especially with their bowling attack at full strength and they wasted no time in getting stuck into the Quatt line up. Dan Bowen and Kashif Hussain both struck twice to leave the hosts 52-4 and when Shabbir Khan quickly took a brace of his own it left the leaders struggling at 75-6. Shabbir then turned an ankle, replaced in the field by Whitchurch chairman Iain Marsh, but with the experienced Stuart Walters joined by Alex Starr the game took a fresh twist. Walters playing the supporting role to Starr, a player who has taken his time to establish himself in the Premier Division after his winter move from Chelmarsh, but who now played an outstanding match winning knock under huge pressure. He ended on 45no while Walters made a controlled unbeaten 20, a win

that means Quatt extend their lead at the top of the league and make it odds on that they bring the league title back to South Shropshire.

Miles who is enjoying an outstanding season with the ball took 5-35 while there was also a brace for Zach White. In reply, despite losing Miles for 0, Jason Oakes at last came into some form seeing his side home with 60no to a 7 wicket success. It will be interesting to see if Oakes can hit the ground running in his preferred White Ball format, if he can then don't be surprised to see Ludlow climb the table...

Wem will be delighted to leave Morda Rd after a 43 run victory that looked unlikely at various points during the afternoon. Batting first they were in big trouble at 16-4 before Harry Astley (41) and Muhammed Irfan (35) joined forces for a 75 run partnership that ultimately proved to be the difference between the sides. Once they departed there was only token resistance from the usually reliable Wem lower order and a score of 132 would have been eyed up favourably by the Oswestry batsmen. Joe Monk (2-43) and Shak Marshall (3-41) led the home attack with Henry Walker (3-17) wrapping the innings up. In reply Oswestry put 34 on the board for the first wicket, but that was as good as it got once Irfan got to work bowling his usual exemplary spell. 5-18 off 15 overs yet again the pro proving why he is one of the best in club cricket in the country. With Tom Astley leading the seam attack with 3-39, the game was closed out with Oswestry dismissed for 89. Wem another team who favour the White Ball format as they proved in the Birmingham League in 2021 and 2022 and they will no doubt look to reduce the gap to Quatt and Whitchurch.

The final game of the day saw **Frankton** secure a narrow 3 wicket win at **Shrewsbury**, a result that pushes the county town side into the relegation zone for the first time this season while ending a bad run of results for the men from Hardwicke Park. Captain Tom Welti and Scott Hale took 4 wickets each as Shrews were dismissed for 131, with the visitors in a hurry in reaching their target for the loss of 7 wickets inside 22 overs, with Tom Wilkie and George Dickin both making 30 before Ryan Kruger got them over the line with 22no.
